COP26

I had the opportunity over the weekend to meet with the new Secretary of State for Education and some his team in Glasgow. It was heartening to see climate change, sustainability and biodiversity featuring prominently in the department's agenda and good to be seen as part of the solution to their problem. We will be keeping close to this and doing all that we can to positively influence their decision making. The fact that we were invited shows that constantly engaging the department and getting FSC's name in front of them does pay off.

The key elements of the <u>DfE's new plan</u> includes putting world-leading climate change education in place by 2023, a plan to encourage children to improve and record the biodiversity of their local school and then upload the information to a new virtual National Education Park, and they have pinched our idea about Climate Change Ambassadors and morphed it into a Climate Leaders Award. They will be building on these ideas over the next 6 months before publishing a full strategy. I welcome the clear link made between connection to nature, the skills developed and the mention of the importance of this for future study and careers. It's a line that we have used repeatedly with DfE in our lobbying work.

Business Managers' Meeting

On Monday and Tuesday thirty five of us got together at Preston Montford. It was an opportunity to take stock and prepare for the coming year. Despite the environmental impact and other implications, I felt that we needed to come together to meet, share our experiences and take the opportunity to review our policies and processes ready for 2022 and beyond. It was a busy programme designed to cover a lot of ground; from ensuring that we had a common understanding of the current position of our charity to examining what works and what doesn't. Many of you had submitted your ideas on this ahead of the meeting and those were also put in the melting pot. From my perspective it allowed us, albeit briefly, to identify gaps in knowledge, weakness in process and anomalies in policy and provided a great opportunity to meet, share ideas and experiences, and importantly break down any barriers or misconceptions that might exist. Thank you to Arran and the team for hosting us so well.
