## **Government Environmental Improvement Plan**

Whilst we were away at conference the Government announced its <u>Environmental Improvement</u> <u>Plan</u>. The official <u>press release</u> strikes an upbeat tone and there are things that we can welcome, but you don't have to dig too far to find out that the aim for everyone to live within 15 minutes of green or blue space is non statutory. The aim to halt the decline of nature by 2030 before reversing it is unambitious, given the state of our already nature deprived nation. It's a point that Field Studies Council and many others included in our response to the consultation.

## **People and Nature Study**

Natural England run this long-term study and it continues to provide really useful information about who and how people connect to nature and access green spaces. There's a separate study that focussed on children too. The study ran throughout the covid pandemic, <u>providing reports</u> and evidence base for policy makers about the vital importance of nature connection and local green spaces. There's also a <u>data explorer</u> which can help organisations drill down into the data sets. It's the kind of thing that will make the Digital and Data team happy, I'm sure.
