Biodiversity Team

The Biodiversity team has published a useful <u>summary of operational plans for 2024</u>. The focus is in-person courses at Field Studies Council's centres, but useful for everyone who has the opportunity to tell customers and partners about this part of our charity's work.

Learners consistently rate courses as excellent and they have earned the high net promoter score of 58. In just 12 months, 50+ organisations have commissioned bespoke training online and in venues across the UK. Independent market research shows huge unmet demand for biodiversity courses so the team has lots to do.
