Field Studies Council was one of the many <u>signatories on a letter</u> urging the new First Minister to support it. We also took the opportunity to write again to all of the members with our centres in their constituency or region, thanking those that we know are in favour and urging others to support the bill. You can <u>watch the debate</u> from the Plenary session held on 17th April starting at about 15:39. Sadly the proposal to take the bill forward to the next stage lost by one vote. There were warm words from the ruling group and working to see how the ideas of the bill could be taken forward without it.

On a more positive note, Sam Rowlands MS who proposed the bill and Paul Davies MS for Dale came for a visit and Mark Isherwood MS is taking up our invitation to visit Rhyd-y-creuau for the first time, so we look forward to hearing what the Plan B might be.

City Nature Challenge

Join people in cities around the world in an epic, global mission to record as much wildlife as possible. Field Studies Council are joining forces with organisations across the UK to get as many people as possible taking part in the 7th international City Nature Challenge between Friday 26th April – Monday 29th April. Over the four-day challenge, people across the UK – and the world – will be coming together to share observations of nature all around us, using the free Maturalist app. Last year over 100,000 observations were submitted across the UK.

on iNaturalist, any records in the UK can count, as well as see a live feed of wildlife being recorded across your region.

Over the weekend, share your nature sightings. Download the iNaturalist app, take a photo of the nature you find, upload and share. The app will help you identify what you've found, and a community of wildlife experts will work together to confirm the exact species. It's more important than ever that we know what wildlife is living in the UK, where it's located and how it's doing – take part with your own photos! Cycle to Work

Who can apply? The Cycle to Work scheme is open to staff who:

- Have been working at Field Studies Council for a minimum of 12 months.
- Have a permanent contract of employment for a minimum of 30 hours per week, yearround.
- Agree to the scheme conditions section 32 (page 204 onwards) of the updated staff handbook.
